## **Success**

Philbreak, the Order's first highadventure project to sell out in its first year, was a joint project created by the OA and the Philmont Staff Association for Scouters age 18-25. The project was a huge success and met the three unique objectives of program.

Almost half of the motivated participants have applied to serve on Philmont staff this summer. Participants provided 1,725 hours of service and 121.88 burnt acres were rehabilitated in the northern part of Philmont that was ravaged by devastating fires in June of 2002. Finally, an inspirational, servant leadership-focused alternative spring break was provided to 81 Scouters: 32 from the Central Region; 13 from the Northeast Region; 23 from the Southern Region; and 13 from the Western

I attended the last session, eager to experience a week of service and fellowship. Upon arriving at the ranch, we were debriefed on the purpose of our service, divided into three workgroups, and introduced to the process of contour log felling to stop erosion and stimulate new plant growth.





## egacy of Servant \_eadership

Thomas McBride's 60plus years of service to the Order were recognized at the 2002 National Order of the Arrow Conference when he was presented with the first Lifetime. Achievement Award.

McBride's servant leadership in the Order began in 1939, when he was inducted into the Anicus Lodge in Wilkinsburg,

Pennsylvania. He served as the bugler at the Order's 1940 national meeting. He later became an Eagle Scout and served the Order as an area chief.

At the 1950 National Scout Jamboree, Tom led 36 Arrowmen to form the first OA Service Corps. In recognition of his service to the Order, Tom received the Distinguished Service Award at the 1952 NOAC.

He was named to the

national OA committee in 1953. In 1957, Tom recommended that no one over the age of 21 be allowed to vote on lodge issues or hold a lodge office.

In 1974, National OA Committee Chairman George Feil appointed Tom and Dr. Carl Marchetti as vice chairmen of the committee. Tom was appointed chairman four years later and served in that position until September 1984. In

1994, Tom received the Silver Antelope Award.

Tom continues to serve as a member of the Founders' Advisory Council. Professionally, Tom worked his way up the ladder at Westinghouse Electric Supply Company and retired as its vice president for marketing. Tom McBride has one son, Jim, who is a lawyer located in Pittsburgh.

The results of the survey were reviewed at the December 2002 national planning meeting in Dallas, where a committee of key youth and adults were appointed to an LLD task force.

The new program will be Web-based, which will allow immediate updating. It will encompass all aspects of the LLD for lodges—from the questionnaire assessment and initial invitation letter to the final thank-you letters for attendance and service.

With the help of an Order of the Arrow Matching Service Grant, Otena Lodge of Brownwood, Texas, made a permanent contribu-

tion to Comanche Trail Council's wilderness Scout camp by building a new health lodge at Camp Billy Gibbons. "Receiving the grant gave Otena Lodge the kick-start for the project. From that point it just took off," said Scout Executive David Foil.

More than 100 volunteers contributed 1,000 service hours to complete the 720-square-foot health lodge. It has quarters for the health officer, a ward room, an examination area, an isolation room and a bathroom. The building has central heating and air-conditioning and is well-insulated. It is covered with a standing seam metal roof—the first of its kind in the area. The health lodge was constructed completely by volunteer labor and adult supporters who had no prior relationship to Scouting.

Funding for the project came from numerous sources. The council received a \$4,000 matching grant from the OA and financial gifts and in-kind donations from local businesses.

Many Arrowmen enjoyed donating their cheerful service because of the hands-on construction skills that they learned. "To the Arrowmen, it was a labor of love. Without the help of the service grant, our dreams could never have become reality," said Lodge Chief Joey Ellis.

# Three Essential Needs of People

Why do Arrowmen return to Order of the Arrow events after their Ordeal? What brings them back? How do leaders create an environment that group members choose to revisit?

The answer is that there are three essential needs of all people in groups.

The first need is to be heard. How do you feel when your ideas are not heard? If people's ideas and comments are not heard, they are unable to build trust or form relationships. In a group, relationships are vital to success.

If a member of your lodge executive committee proposes an idea, be open to it. Accept it, even if it is new or different. Respond with an acknowledgment so that the person knows that his idea has been heard.

The second essential need of people is to contribute. Human beings have a natural desire to contribute to something larger than themselves. At the same time, a group has an inherent need to bring in

things from outside the group.

When people feel that they have made a difference or that they are needed, they return to the group. Think about how it feels to see the smiles of the people who receive the benefits of your service. This feeling compels you to provide service again.

As leaders, Arrowmen should seek opportunities for people to contribute. Ask a Scout to help you set up chairs at a lodge event. Ask an Ordeal member to run for chapter chief. These opportunities will help those Scouts to realize that they are making a difference, and they will experience the joy of contribution.

The third essential need of people is to belong. Simply put, we go where our friends go because they provide us a sense of belonging. Without feeling that they belong, humans have no desire to contribute to the group and likely will not return to it.

Brotherhood and fellowship are the essence of the Order. To be effective, we need to develop pro-



gram elements that use these principles to build friendships.

People only take initiative on behalf of others when these three factors are high. As leaders, we must create conditions that nurture these three fundamen-

The next time you are leading your group, consider asking your team members these three questions:

- Have I created room for your ideas to be heard?
- Do you feel that you are making a difference?
- Are you having fun with friends here?

If the answers to these questions can always be "yes," then you are doing a great job of nurturing an environment that will provide a great experience in the Brotherhood of Cheerful Service.

## Climbing Kilimanjaro

Few Americans get to visit Africa, and even fewer have the opportunity to climb Mount Kilimaniaro, the tallest free-standing mountain in the world. For eight Arrowmen, the dream of climbing to the snow-capped summit of

Kilimanjaro became a reality this past February.

On February 15, eight Arrowmen traveled to Tanzania in East Africa for the trip of a lifetime. National OA committee members Jack Butler and Bruce Walcutt Section S4S Adviser Jeff Jonasen, Section C4A Associate Adviser David Yoder, Echockotee Lodge Adviser Norm Gregory, Bill Nalle, Kirt Kiester, and John Horton participated in the climb. Jack Butler expressed everyone's sentiments with his description of the trip as "absolutely incredible."

The backpacking expedition started at 6,000 feet in the beau-

tiful rain forests of equatorial Tanzania and continued upward, climbing about 2,000 feet in elevation every day for the next seven days.

Reaching the summit, Uhuru Peak, on the morning of February 23, the sense of accomplishment and brotherhood was overwhelming.

Most of the group also enjoyed a four-day safari through the spectacular Serengeti plain and Ngorongoro Crater. They saw lions, giraffes, cheetahs, elephants and rhinos, as well as a magnificent tour of the pristine environment in Tanzania.

## **Even Trainers Need Training**

In January, about 50 Arrowmen representing each of the four regions traveled to the Florida Sea Base for the National Leadership Seminar's Train-the-Trainer seminar. This seminar is held every two years to teach how to plan and execute National Leadership Seminars.

All first-time recipients are presented the original award (the white ribbon with the gold compass). Arrowmen who earn the award more than once may purchase

the silver attachment and the bronze attachment for having earned it a third time. More than 6,250 Arrowmen have earned the award, and 1,015 earned it a second time.
